Become an Election Judge

Election judges are responsible for administering election procedures in each polling place on Election Day. Serving as an election judge is a great opportunity to serve our community and to be involved in the election process.

Election Judge Requirements

- · You must be eligible to vote in Minnesota
- You must be able read, write and speak English
- You must complete a two to three-hour paid training session

Time Off Work to Serve as an Election Judge

Minnesota Statute 204B.195 allows individuals to take time off from work, without penalty or loss of wage, to serve as an election judge on Election Day. A 20-day written notice requesting to be absent from work for this purpose must be submitted to the employer. The request must be accompanied by an Employer's Notification Letter from the City of Baxter indicating the day(s) and hours the employee will serve as an election judge. An employer may reduce the salary or wages of an employee serving as an election judge by the amount paid to the election judge by the appointing authority during the time the employee was absent from the place of employment.
